Grantee Overview

Muscogee Creek Nation Project LAUNCH of Oklahoma is located in the northeastern region of the state and spans 7,200 square miles—comparable to the state of New Jersey—with 11 counties in its jurisdictional boundaries. The geography is characterized by rural areas, small towns, and a large urban area (Tulsa), which is located on the northern border. Substantial portions of the Muscogee Creek Nation's service area are impoverished and underserved. Although some of the Muscogee Creek Nation tribal members live in moderate proximity to affluent areas, they remain functionally isolated from mainstream society due to cultural, economic, social, justice, and educational barriers. Muscogee Creek Nation tribal members are a community within a community—a culture within a culture. The current population, including members of other tribes residing within the Muscogee Creek Nation service area, is around 85,000. Muscogee Creek Nation Project LAUNCH seeks to build a comprehensive and integrated system of care that will advance the delivery of services, practices, and cultural experiences that promote the wellness of young American Indian children and their families within the area served by the tribe.

Project Milestones

All <u>Project LAUNCH</u> grantees implement promotion and prevention strategies intended to increase access to high-quality prevention and promotion services for children and families. In Muscogee Creek Nation Project LAUNCH, these five strategies are implemented through the following activities:

- Screening and Assessment: Ongoing screenings and assessments are being conducted in a
 variety of settings within the selected service area of Muscogee Creek Nation. Settings include
 tribal clinics, hospitals, behavioral health sites, schools, community centers, early childhood
 centers, and Head Start centers. Muscogee Creek Nation Project LAUNCH staff use an electronic
 version of the Survey of Well-being of Young Children (SWYC) via the iPad Patient Tools
 application.
- Early Childhood Mental Health Consultation: Muscogee Creek Nation Project LAUNCH's two halftime consultants provide early childhood mental health consultation (ECMHC) to tribal Head Start classrooms and child care centers on an as-needed basis. Muscogee Creek Nation Project LAUNCH also developed an ECMHC protocol and hosted a training for Head Start staff on consultation and referrals for treatment services.
- Enhanced Home Visiting: Muscogee Creek Nation Project LAUNCH enhances existing home visiting
 services by collaborating with tribal programs and community agencies. To support these services,
 Muscogee Creek Nation Project LAUNCH offers training in evidence-based practices and creates and
 distributes educational and promotional materials for the services. In addition, Muscogee Creek

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Nation Project LAUNCH convenes a home visiting alliance for participating home visiting programs. Alliance members participate in trainings, such as training on the use of the SWYC, an introduction to infant massage, how to coordinate services with the state-wide ParentPro parenting support program, and The Happiest Baby on the Block Program – How to Calm a Baby Using the 5 S's. The alliance has also been working on a marketing campaign to promote home visiting programs across the state. Muscogee Creek Nation Project LAUNCH has been partnering with Cherokee Nation

Project LAUNCH to plan and host a home visiting leadership summit in the summer of 2016.

- Integrating Behavioral Health into Primary Care: Muscogee Creek Nation Project LAUNCH is working on promoting the use of an electronic version of the SWYC screener within their tribal health clinics by partnering with their information technology department to create a form that can be integrated into its electronic medical record system, NextGEn. Muscogee Creek Nation Project LAUNCH provides *Lunch and Learn* sessions for the tribal health clinics on issues such as social-emotional development, managing behavior, and developmental milestones. Muscogee Creek Nation Project LAUNCH is active in the promotion of the American Academy of Pediatrics Bright Futures parent handouts that provide information on children's well-child visits, developmental stages, safety and prevention, family life, and health issues.
- **Family Strengthening**: Muscogee Creek Nation Project LAUNCH is offering the <u>Incredible Years</u> program to families, schools, and children to support young children's relationships with their

parents and other primary caregivers. Project staff have been trained in the Parent and Teacher Program, and parenting groups are currently underway. The Incredible Years Small Group Dinosaur Program for children was also provided in Okmulgee. To date, 28 Muscogee (Creek) Nation Head Start teachers have been trained in the Incredible Years Teacher Program, which involves 40 hours of training over five days. Muscogee Creek Nation Project LAUNCH offers infant massage classes in small groups or one-on-one sessions, and is involved in many community events throughout the year, such as community baby showers, children's mental health day, and child abuse prevention month.

Systems Integration

Project LAUNCH is intended to improve coordination and collaboration across systems that serve young children and their families. Muscogee Creek Nation Project LAUNCH has made connections with the state of Oklahoma and collaborates on implementation of ECMHC. These measures have paved the way for

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future collaboration opportunities. Planning/collaboration meetings are regularly scheduled with Muscogee Creek Nation, Cherokee Nation, and the state of Oklahoma Project LAUNCH programs.
